### Copyright Observance – what you can and cannot do.

Copyright is a federal law that protects authors for their original creations such as written works, music, art, films, etc. The original creator has the right to decide how it is distributed or reproduced. Copyrighted material is usually accompanied by the word "Copyright" or the copyright symbol ©.

#### Basic guidance regarding the use of copyrighted material:

- Reproduction of fully copyrighted material is prohibited without first obtaining permission from the author.
- For works published after 1977, the copyright lasts for the life of the author plus 70 years.
- All works published in the United States before 1923 are in the public domain.
- Works published after 1922, but before 1978 are protected for 95 years from the date of publication.
- A work is considered published when the author makes it available to the public on an unrestricted basis.
- Unpublished works are on different terms.

#### Other types of copyright exist that offer authors and users greater flexibility.

- Creative Commons (CC) licensing. CC enables authors to release their works from "all rights reserved" to "some rights reserved."
- CC licenses allow creators to assign their works with certain restrictions such as:
  - Commercial use allowed/not allowed
  - Modifications allowed
  - Commercial use and modifications allowed

	CC Symbol	Description
1		<b>[BY] By Attribution</b> Permits all uses of the original work, as long as it is attributed to the original author (Note: Attribution is in all six licences)
2		<b>[BY-SA] By Attribution – Share Alike</b> As above, but any derivative work must also use a similar license, hence "Share Alike"
3		<b>[BY-ND] By Attribution – No Derivatives</b> Licensed works are free to use / share with attribution, but does not permit derivative works from the original
4		<b>[BY-NC] By Attribution – Non-Commercial</b> Licensed works are free to use / share / remix with attribution, but does not permit commercial use of the original work
5		<b>[BY-NC-SA] By Attribution – Non-commercial – Share Alike</b> Does not permit commercial use of the original work, and any derivatives from it must use a similar licence
6		<b>[BY-NC-ND] By Attribution – Non-Commercial – No Derivatives</b> Does not permit any commercial use or derivatives of the original work. <i>Note: this is the most restrictive of CC licenses, and is often regarded as a "free advertising" license</i>

**Public domain** is the term that refers to works that are not eligible for copyright or for which copyright protection is no longer available. Anyone wishing to use, reproduce or distribute a work in the public domain may do so without needing to seek permission from the owner.
